Firstperson, second-person or third-person narration can significantly impact how readers engage with the story and perceive the characters. *Zikora*, has been written in first person narrative, as the protagonist Zikora is the narrator of the story. Adichie is known for creating complex and relatable characters. In *Zikora*, she likely employs vivid descriptions, internal monologues and dialogue to develop the protagonist and supporting characters.

Zikora describes each and every minute detail of the protagonist's journey into her motherhood which is fraught with emotions and challenges. As she experiences the physical and emotional changes in her pregnancy, Adichie vividly portray the complex inner world of a woman preparing to become to be a mother "I had prepared for pain but this was not mere pain. It was something like pain and different from pain. It sat like fire in my back, spreading to my thighs, squeezing and crushing my insides, pulling downward, spiraling" (Adichie, 05).

The tone and style of the narrator's voice contribute to the narrative discourse. The narrative voice can influence the reader's interpretation of events and characters in the text. The narrative voice of *Zikora* is characterized by a first-person view, providing readers with direct insight into the thoughts, emotions, and experiences of the protagonist. The story is told through Zikora's perspective, allowing readers to connect with her on a personal level and gain a deep understanding of her inner struggles and the complexities of her life as a Nigerian woman.

Another aspect of narrative discourse is dialogues; dialogues between characters are part of the narrative discourse. It was real hummus or nothing for me, none of those flavors invented to appeal to the American obsession for variety. I read somewhere that love was about this, the nuggets of knowledge about our beloved that we so fluently hold" (Adichie, 13).

These thematic elements can be woven into the narrative through various literary devices. One of the central themes in *Zikora* is the clash of cultures. Zikora is caught between her Nigerian heritage and the American healthcare system. Adichie deftly portrays the stark differences in birthing practices, emphasizing how cultural expectations and norms influence Zikora's choices during her pregnancy. "I'd read somewhere that maternal mortality was higher in America than anywhere else in the Western world or was it just higher for Black women? The subject had never really interested me. I'd felt at most a faraway concern, as though it was something that happened to other people. I should have paid more attention" (Adichie, 06).

In the above lines Zikora's anxiousness about maternal mortality can be seen, she worries more because she is a black woman in American society. The cultural tension serves as a lens through which the story explores issues of identity and belonging.

Identity is a recurring theme in Adichie's works and *Zikora* is no exception for it. As Zikora faces the challenges of motherhood and cultural dissonance, her sense of self is put to



the test. When Zikora gives birth to a boy, doctors talk about circumcising for which she responds saying, "You Americans may circumcise, but we don't do barbarism here in Europe. The only reason it's tolerated at all is so we don't get called Islamophobic" (Adichie 18).

Readers witness her evolving self-perception and her attempts to reconcile her Nigerian identity with her life in America. Narrative discourse is the art of storytelling itself, encompassing all the elements that come together to create a cohesive and compelling narrative.
